Tonight I was telling you about a little red segment on the bike map, where an otherwise calm bike route zig-zags across a busy road. I remembered the experience pretty vividly, but couldn't remember the street names.

It was on Route 47, coming down Parkfield from north of Braker. (If you ever want to bike to the Domain, you'd take Route 47.)

The cross-street was Peyton Gin. I've never become familiar with Peyton Gin, but looking at the map, I can see why it's busy -- it provides a short-cut between 183 & Lamar.
